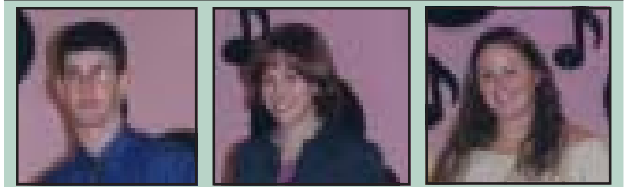

Morrisville State College and Nextel Partners Make History

Morrisville State College's small town values and cutting-edge technology have made it a national model; the college is believed to be the first in the nation to comprehensively replace all residence hall landlines with personal cell phones. This pioneering spirit generated widespread attention this fall – including coverage in the New York Times and USA Today – thanks to an innovative new partnership with leading wireless services provider Nextel Partners.

The initiative is part of a broader technology plan to create a completely wireless campus. The college is known as one of the most technologically advanced campuses in the country. It earned the distinction of being named "America's Most Wired College" two consecutive years after issuing students IBM laptop computers.

During Welcome Weekend in August, the Morrisville Auxiliary Corporation established a distribution hub in the Student Activities Center on the Morrisville State College campus and successfully dispersed more than 1,700 Nextel cell phones to some very excited resident students. "Distribution was more successful than anyone anticipated," remarked Glenn Gaslin, general manager of the Morrisville Auxiliary Corporation. "Students were thrilled with their personal Nextel cell phones, and parents were reassured knowing they could reach their son or daughter at any moment."

Each Motorola i30sx cell phone offers caller ID, unlimited incoming calls, call waiting and a digital phone book with room for up to 250 contacts. The favorite feature among students on campus is Nextel Direct ConnectSM, which functions like a long-range digital walkie-talkie and offers instant access at the touch of a button. Students have unlimited use of this feature throughout upstate New York at no additional cost.

Nextel Partners has worked diligently to provide Morrisville State College with phone options and services that are valuable to college students. Based in Kirkland, Wash., and an affiliate of Nextel Communications, the company has quickly established itself as a wireless industry leader due to its differentiated product and focus on customer satisfaction. "The range of services Nextel

Partners provides makes it a good fit for our college and our corporation," stated Gaslin. "We have been impressed with their commitment and enthusiasm." The partnership is a win-win according to John Chapple, Nextel Partners president, CEO and chairman of the board. "Demand for our differentiated product – especially our digital walkie-talkie feature that connects users at the touch of a button – doesn't stop with business," Chapple said. "Students today are more wired than ever before and among the most savvy technology users. It only makes sense to offer them what we believe is the best technology on the market."

According to Jean Boland, Morrisville State College assistant vice president for technology services, the partnership with Nextel Partners provides students with more options and benefits. The previous landline plan required students to share phones and offered only local and incoming calls. "Through our partnership with Nextel Partners and other efforts to arm students with the most up-to-date technology, our students are gaining a competitive edge, especially important in today's society where knowledge of the latest technology is critical," Boland said.

Jody Williams, manager of Morrisville's Nextel Authorized Service Center, said "Our authorized service center allows us to offer a blend of valuable services conveniently on campus. Our team is equipped to handle distribution, trouble shooting, technical issues and long-distance phone contracts, and provide the most comprehensive solution to any problem or situation." Since it's difficult for many students to travel off campus, the convenience of this express facility is valuable to students, faculty and staff. The Nextel Authorized Service Center offers service to Alumni, the Norwich campus and friends of Morrisville State College as well.

Craig Pozniak, a senior enrolled in the Electronic Marketing and Publishing program, loves having the Nextel Direct ConnectSM. "I think all the students enjoy having the walkie-talkie feature. You can find your friends for lunch or dinner, and when you go away on the weekend, your friends are only a button away."

Students are not the only ones on campus who are pleased with the technology. Phyllis Tucker, an assistant professor in the School of Business, is impressed with the opportunities Morrisville State College offers its students. "Upon entering the workforce our students will be at a distinct advantage," said Tucker. When asked if the phones were a problem in her class, she laughed, "No, I put it right in the syllabus: 'cell phones must be turned off during class.'" Similarly, when laptops were introduced, professors found it helpful to develop user guidelines. "It really isn't a problem," she adds. "Our students are responsible and genuinely embarrassed if their phone rings accidentally. It has not been an issue in my classroom at all."

A student from SUNY IT, Chris Flack agrees that the more students are exposed to technology, the more prepared they are to communicate and interact in a technology-driven society.

"They are at such an advantage," said Jessamyn Harter, a sophomore at a nearby college. "I wish desperately that I had the technology and resources that the students at Morrisville have."

U.S. Senator Hillary Clinton (D-NY) shared her support of the new program. "I want to congratulate Morrisville State College and Nextel Partners on this groundbreaking initiative. In our modern world, communication is key to success and achievement, especially for young people as they prepare for the future," Clinton stated. "Together they are leading the way in bringing new technology to the students at Morrisville State College and again putting New York at the forefront of the communications age."

"Our partnership with Nextel Partners will bring the college to the next level with respect to technology," added Morrisville State College President Raymond Cross. "Cellular technology has become an increasingly important part of the way our society communicates, and in recent years, colleges have watched more and more students favor cell phones over landline phones. We are proud to work with Nextel Partners to integrate this technology into our campus culture."

In conversations with alumni, many of you have expressed your frustration at the lack of lodging near the college. You would like to visit for Mustang Weekend, commencement or other special events at the college, but find it inconvenient to stay 20 minutes away in Oneida or Canastota.

I am happy to announce a solution to that problem. Carey Development, LLC of Albany, N.Y., has committed to build an 80-room Holiday Inn Express immediately adjacent to campus, which will be located on South Street, south of the Automotive Performance Center.

Not only will a nationally recognized hotel chain benefit alumni seeking a place to stay, but it will afford opportunities for the college, village and surrounding area. EOP Pre-College Summer Program Returns After 20 Year Absence

Last summer, Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) students began studies early at Morrisville State College during a four-week Pre-College Summer Program (PCSP). PCSP gives students a sneak preview of the rigorous college curriculum before they begin a full course load. Sixty-six students braved the July heat to get a jump-start on their freshman year at Morrisville.

EOP, a coordination of supportive services designed to provide access to higher education, takes the approach to fulfilling SUNY's policy that "every student capable of completing a program of higher education shall have the opportunity to do so." Guided by this precept, the SUNY Office of Opportunity Programs offers educational opportunities through its 64 campuses. EOP provides academic, personal, career, transfer, and financial support to New York state residents with a high school diploma or its equivalent who show promise for mastering college-level work, but may otherwise not be admitted. The program serves students from a variety of circumstances that may present barriers to academic success.

PCSP promotes the development of a support network among students and academic staff, empowers students to examine their strengths and weaknesses, and emphasizes that it is all right to ask for help. A large component of the program acquaints pre-freshman with college life, and provides them with a successful start to the college environment. Highly structured and intensive activities center on academic course offerings that strengthen reading, writing, mathematics, communication skills, and computer technology. The SUNY Office of Opportunity Programs, Morrisville Auxiliary Corporation, Sheila Johnson Institute, and Morrisville State College funded the PCSP. The program covers all student costs for the summer study. "The success of our Pre-College Summer

Program stemmed from the financial support of the college. Dr. Ray Cross, our president, was supportive all along the way. Though funds were very limited, he made sure we had the funding base that would make our proposal acceptable. He saw the importance of such a program to incoming freshmen," said Dr. Shelly Williams, EOP Director. "However, it took the entire college community to make the effort a success. From maintenance staff up through the President's office, it was the cooperation of the entire college community that made it work."

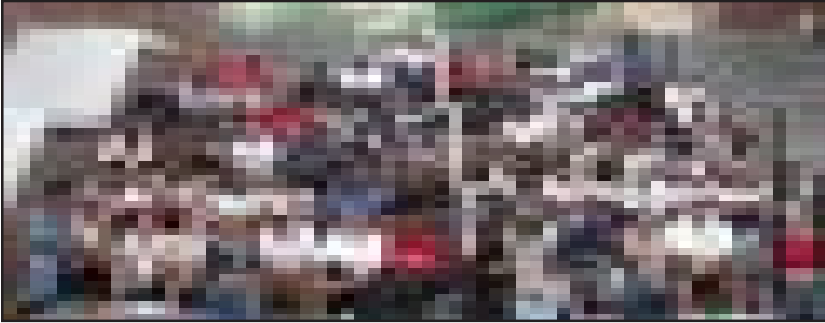
Students enrolled in four classes: mathematics, writing, computers, and the freshman experience course, with the intention of building academic skills and confidence.

In addition, a weekly series of workshops focused on the college adjustment process. A "Freshman Experience" course was designed to help facilitate students with transition from high school to college. EOP Counselors

Louisa Richards, Will Pryor, and Erin Colvin provided instruction for the course.

In addition to required academic classes, students had a full schedule of recreational and social activities. During the program, students became familiar with the campus, the community, and a wide range of resources. They were also introduced to performance expectations, workload, and behavioral strategies that are important aspects of college life and academic success. The students traveled off-campus and enjoyed some local activities, including trips to Verona Beach State Park, Six Flags at Darien Lake, and Glenwood Movieplex Cinema.

As the PCSP progressed, students formed bonds with each other, their peers, and professional staff. EOP staff especially became acquainted with students, and became a unique support network on a personal and academic level that will continue for their entire college experience.



Record Crowd Attends Alumni Hockey Game

\$15 Million "Campaign for Morrisville" Heating Up At The Norwich Campus

\$10 MILLION RAISED FOR MSC DURING SILENT PHASE OF CAMPAIGN

With a record 56 inches of snowfall having already accumulated by the time this was written, and temperatures reaching 22 below zero, it might be hard to imagine how hot the \$15 million Campaign For Morrisville has become!

And yet, by the time Dr. Cross and the Morrisville College Foundation Board hosted the September 19, 2003 kick-off event for the Norwich Campus Legacy Campaign, the planned end to the quiet phase of the "Campaign For Morrisville," the 1998 Goal of raising \$10 million by 2008 had already been reached - five years ahead of schedule - with approximately \$700,000 of the \$10M coming from 7% of Morrisville State College's alumni over the previous five years (the rest coming from friends, corporations, and private foundations).

In January of 2004, Chancellor Robert L. King announced his \$3 Billion Challenge and asked the 64 SUNY colleges to raise another \$2 billion by 2011: giving Morrisville State College its 2011 Goal of \$15 million.

Thanks to Dr. Sheila Johnson's continued and unparalleled support, and incredibly generous gifts from the Roger W. Follett Foundation, Greater Norwich Foundation, Otis A. Thompson Foundation and NBT Bank, we are off to a fantastic start!

On the heels of Dr. Sheila Johnson's, and Morrisville State College's first million dollar gift, The Roger Follett Foundation, Inc. in Chenango County, has made a \$400,000 pledge to support the Morrisville State College Norwich Campus's Legacy Campaign over the next four years. In order to properly honor the memory of Roger W. Follett, the new Norwich Campus academic building has been named "Roger W. Follett Hall."

The Follett Foundation has supported many organizations in Chenango County in memory of Roger Follett, a humble dairy farmer and businessman from Norwich, who in life and after death has so benevolently assisted the needy, and rural and elderly residents of Chenango County. Many of his foundation's gifts have focused on health care and for nearly a decade, Follett Scholarships enable 10 to 12 nursing students to attend Morrisville State College each year.

Beginning in 2005, the Greater Norwich Foundation has committed \$250,000 over five years to see that the faculty and students within Roger W. Follett Hall benefit from leading-edge instructional technologies and laboratory equipment. For more than 20 years, students attending classes at Morrisville State College's Norwich Campus have been awarded Greater Norwich Foundation Scholarships. In order to honor this long-standing and important relationship, the lobby in Roger W. Follett Hall will be called the Greater Norwich Lobby.

Following a shared commitment made by the Otis A. Thompson Foundation and NBT Bank, the new library in Roger W. Follett Hall will forever honor the legacy of each.

Roger W. Follett Hall is a beautiful two-story building nearly four times the size of the current space and is being constructed on the Conkey Avenue side to the east of The Eaton Center's main building. A lighted walkway will connect the college to The Eaton Center, physically representing the Norwich Campus's commitment to integrate hands-on business experience with its curriculum and enhancing the college's collaboration with community businesses.

A very important part of the "Campaign For Morrisville" and the success of the Morrisville College Foundation's Norwich Campaign is due to Morrisville College Foundation board members William H. Smith, Jr., Pete Smith of Wachovia Securities, Richard Runyon of United Methodist Homes, and Norwich Campus dean, Dr. Edward Nichols.

The building is expected to be completed and functional by fall 2005. 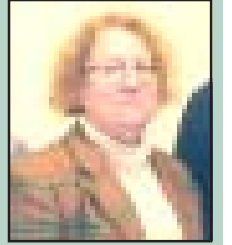

MSC Athletics Complete Fall Season On A High Note

MSC athletics underwent some changes this fall. Men's soccer, under new direction by Tom Daviau, had its best season since 1999. The men went 12-5-1 overall, earning a #5 seed in the regional tournament. Matt Clapp (Chittenango, NY) earned post-season honors for the men, being selected to the NJCAA Region III Second Team. Women's soccer went 11-7-1 overall, earning a #7 seed in the regional tournament. 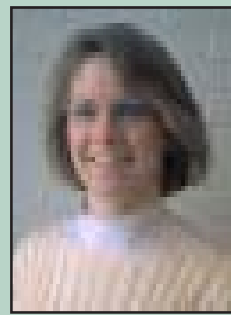

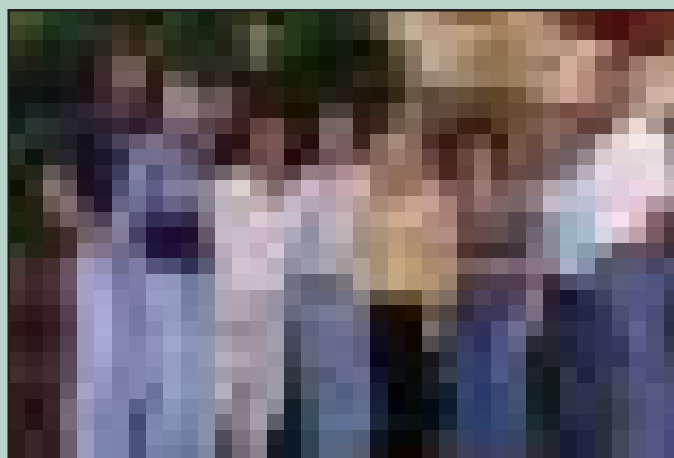
To provide professional support and advice to the growing teacher education initiative at Morrisville State College, alumni identified as current teachers were contacted last spring. They were asked to support the initiative by talking to current college classes, serving on an advisory board, acting as a mentor to our college students, providing professional advice to faculty, or assisting with our teaching-related website and materials. The response was overwhelming; many teacher-alumni offered to help with the effort to prepare Morrisville State students to become future teachers.

A Teacher-Alumni Advisory Board was formed and met for the first time on October 21, 2003. Members of the board, all Morrisville State alumni, are: Mary Maitland, Equine Science teacher at Madison-Oneida BOCES, Jeff Rasmussen, Fourth/Fifth Grade Reading and Math teacher at Oxford Academy and Middle School, Kevin Sharpe, Math teacher at Fabius-Pompey Middle/High School, Elizabeth Joerger, Second Grade teacher at Morrisville-Eaton Central School, Kelly Orth, English/Special Education teacher at Fowler High School in Syracuse, and Sheila Leamer, Family and Consumer Science and Health teacher at Chittenango Central School.

Professor Mary Brown, who is spearheading the campus teacher education initiative, shared with the board the efforts being made to help prepare students for teaching careers. She explained the high student interest and national teacher shortages that prompted the effort at Morrisville, the new courses being offered, the proposed Liberal Arts and Sciences/Teacher Education Transfer program being developed, the activities in the "Corridor to the Classroom" effort funded by the Sheila Johnson Institute, as well as the new teacher education website located at www.morrisville.edu/academics/liberal_arts/teachered. Board members discussed their role in the college's teacher education initiative and offered input about the efforts now in place. The board will meet again during the Spring 2004 semester.

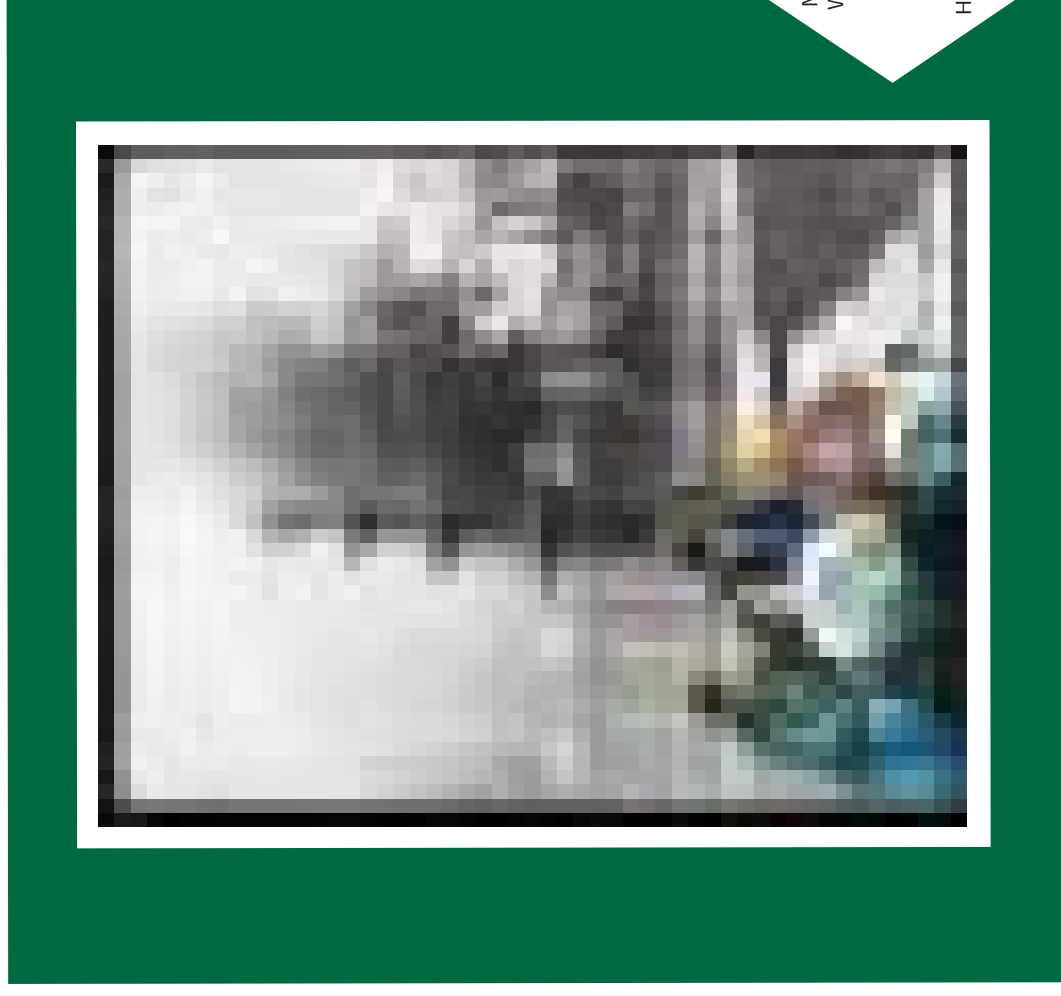

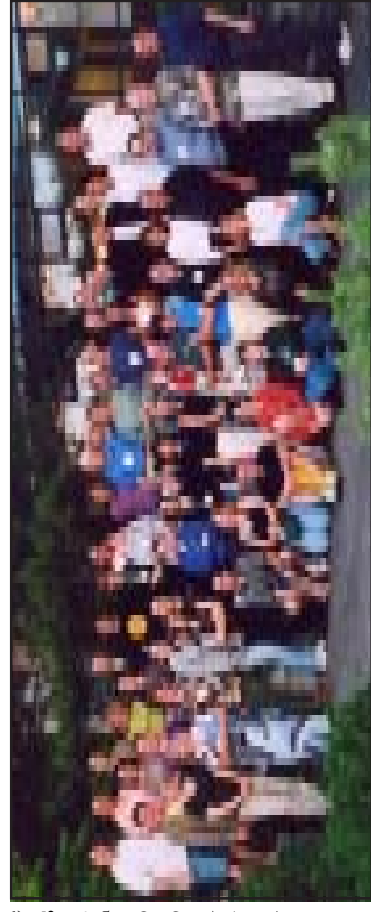
